Introduction

Background Information for Parents

The Eucharist, Holy Communion, is the greatest gift which God has given to us. At the Last Supper, on the night before he died, Jesus celebrated the Passover meal with his disciples. The Passover celebrates the freedom which the people of Israel gained from slavery in Egypt. Just as he was about to be captured, lose his freedom and his life, Jesus took that life in his hands, and gave it as a gift: "This is my body, given for you...This is my blood, poured out for you."

Jesus now wishes your child to share this gift, the greatest expression of his love, in Holy Communion. First Communion day is one of the greatest memories of childhood, and you have an irreplaceable part in guiding you son or daughter to fully appreciate its importance. You have given them the gift of life, and promised at Baptism to support them in their faith journey. As the Baptism rite says, you are the first educator of your child in the ways of faith. The school and parish stand ready to help you in the commitment which you took.

This workbook provides one way in which you can support your child on their journey. The most important way in which you can help your child at this time is by taking them to Mass. This will enable them to

feel part of the parish and community of faith. It will also ensure they can experience at Mass what they are learning about in school.

Enjoy this privileged time in your child's faith formation.

1. Community of Faith



Background Information for Parents

"The Church is an old woman, with many wrinkles and furrows. But she is my mother."

Karl Rahner

A community is formed when people gather together because of shared attitudes, beliefs and interests. When people come together regularly to share experiences, listen and support one another the community is strengthened and can flourish. We are all united in a community of faith, the Catholic community. In the Sacraments of Baptism, Reconciliation and First Holy Communion, the Catholic community opens its arms to welcome new members into the parish.

When your child was baptised, they began the journey of sacramental initiation. When they receive their First Holy Communion, they will be taking the next step on this journey. They will be gathering together to receive the Eucharist, not just as individuals, but as a community.

In this session your child will learn what is meant by a community and discuss different communities they are part of and how this makes them feel. They will learn that a church building is a sacred and holy place but that it is the people who gather there that make up the community of faith. They will explore how they were first initiated into the church community and how their faith strengthens their relationship with God and His community.







2. The Sacraments

Background Information for Parents

Your child has been learning about the seven Sacraments of the Church. These Sacraments are Baptism, Reconciliation, Eucharist, Confirmation, Marriage, Holy Orders and Anointing of the sick. The Sacraments of Initiation are Baptism, Eucharist and Confirmation. When you choose to have your child baptised, they began the journey of Sacramental Initiation.

Help your child to understand the Sacraments by asking them what they have been learning about in school. Talk to your child about the Sacraments that they have already received i.e. Baptism and Reconciliation. Share your experiences of Sacraments with your child. Show your child photos or mementos of these special occasions. Help your child to feel part of the parish community and to experience at Mass what they are learning about in school.







3. Journey of Faith

Background Information for Parents

"Not to go to Communion is like someone dying of thirst beside a spring."

In this section your child will have the opportunity to hear and read the Word of God. As they have progressed through the 'This Is Our Faith' programme, your child has been taught to treat the Holy Bible with reverence and respect. They have heard and reflected upon many narratives from the Old and New Testaments.

Help your child to understand that the liturgy of the word is a special time in the Mass where we are asked to listen in a particular way to the Word of God. Remind them that we listen so that we hear what the Word of God is saying to us. We also listen so that we can know what God's word in the reading is asking us to do.

In class, we have focused on three particular narratives which tell us how God nourished people on their faith journeys. If you have a Bible in your home, you could look at these with your child. Take time to read and reflect together.

Help your child to feel part of the parish community and to experience at Mass what they are also learning about in school.





4. The Last Supper

Background Information for Parents

"God would have given us something greater if he had had anything greater than himself"

In this section, the theme of your child's Religious Education lessons is 'The Last Supper'. Your child will explore the story of The Last Supper and the important words that Jesus used with his friends.

During this section your child will explore nourishment in a physical, mental and spiritual aspect in relation to The Last Supper. You child will look at ways they can keep themselves nourished at school, at home and within the wider Parish community. Your child will know that the Eucharist and wine are a form of spiritual nourishment because it is the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ that he wished to give us.

Your child will be identifying ways to celebrate with their Parish Community and the special meal we share at Mass. Your child will be exploring the Consecration of the Mass and the important words and responses to this part of the Mass.

Your child will be learning about Jesus sacrificing Himself on the cross for us and your child will discuss the meaning of a sacrifice and think about personal experiences. Your child will explore the bread becoming the Body of Jesus Christ and the wine becoming the Blood of Jesus Christ.

The Last Supper

In this section, the theme for your child's Religious Education lessons is 'Holy Communion'. Your child will begin their journey of exploration by looking at the story of the first ever Passover. They will look at Moses and how the Jewish people in Egypt celebrated this. Your child will become more familiar with the Old and the New Testament of the Bible.

They will learn about Jesus' childhood and how he celebrated the Passover each year with his family and friends. They will be reminded that the Passover is a celebration and they will gather together to share their own celebrations.

Your child will then recall the events of Holy Week and what happened on Holy Thursday at the Last Supper.

Your child will then look at their Parish and how they can celebrate with the parish community. During this time the children will be looking at the Consecration and why this is a central focus of the celebration of Mass.

The children will become more familiar with the Parish and the sacred parts of the church.



This is a good time to talk about stories from the Bible and read them with your child, if you have a Bible at home. The message of the Gospel is central to our faith. We encourage the children to listen to and act upon the message of the Gospel.

It would also be a good time to go over the responses and the Creed to help your child to be more involved in the Mass. Remind your child that we listen to the message of the Gospel and then act upon it in our daily lives.



7. Liturgy of the Eucharist

Background Information for Parents

During the last week in class, the children have been learning about the Liturgy of the Eucharist, the central part of Mass which includes the offertory, the consecration, the praying of the Our Father, and the



reception of Holy Communion. They have been thinking about the biblical background of different parts of Mass.

In the class session in the workbook, the children will think about how Jesus asked us, his disciples, to repeat what he did and said in order to remember him. When we don't practise something, like a foreign language we learned at school, or a good habit, we quickly forget. However, the more we practise a skill, a good habit, or our faith by repetition, the more it becomes part of us. Cardinal Basil Hume, who led the Catholic Church in England for many years, said the same thing about Mass:

"It takes many years of being faithful to going to Mass for it to become very much part of your life and very much part of your heart. People who have been going to Mass for many years grow to love it so much that they would never miss it. The difficulty is that some people don't find it easy at first and they give up going, and that's very sad, they miss out on something very important."

The home session will focus on one scriptural passage which we remember at Mass: just before Communion, we say the words of the Roman centurion whose servant Jesus healed, "Lord, I am not worthy

that you should enter under my roof, but only say the word and my servant shall be healed." At Mass we change "servant" to "soul". The session focuses on welcoming a special visitor to your home, and how the children and your family are invited to welcome Jesus in faith.

Bible references for this theme:

Luke 7: 1-10 1 Corinthians 11:23-26 During this theme your child will become more familiar with the following key vocabulary:

Liturgy of the Eucharist, Consecration, tabernacle, chalice, Offertory, Holy Communion



In Class

In section 3 we learned about the Last Supper, the sacred meal in which Jesus gave us his body and blood. At the Last Supper

he said, "Do this in memory of me." At Mass we repeat many of the words Jesus and his followers said, and repeat many of Jesus' actions, because by doing so we remember him.

Bible focus

Read the passage from The First Letter of St Paul to the Corinthians 11:23-26:



For I received from the Lord what I also passed on to you: The Lord Jesus, on the night he was betrayed, took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body, which is for you; do this in remembrance of me." In the same way, after supper he took the cup, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood; do this, whenever you drink it, in remembrance of me." For whenever you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

Do you recognize these words? These are the same words which the priest says at the **Consecration**, when the bread and wine are changed into the body and blood of Christ.

Talking Time Activity: The class can interview some altar servers and ask them all the things they have to remember to prepare for Mass when they are serving (robes, lights, microphone, chalice, water, wine, ciborium and hosts, tabernacle key, bells and gong, light the candles etc.) Ask them about any time they forgot to prepare these things properly. Also, how did they learn?

Discuss the importance of remembering, and how we remember by repetition. If we don't practise, we easily forget. To "do this remembrance of me" we have to attend Mass regularly. We also have to learn responses to be ready to take part.

We often want to share our news with visitors: did you share any news?



Now listen to a story from the bible about a man who wanted Jesus to visit his house:

The Healing of the Centurion's Servant. Luke 7: 1-10

When Jesus had come to the end of all he wanted the people to hear, he went into Capernaum. A centurion there had a servant, a favourite of his, who was sick and near death. Having heard about Jesus he sent some Jewish elders to him to ask him to come and heal his servant.

When they came to Jesus they pleaded earnestly with him. 'He deserves this of you' they said 'because he is friendly towards our people; in fact, he is the one who built the synagogue.' So Jesus went with them, and was not very far from the house when the centurion sent word to him by some friends:

'Sir,' he said 'do not put yourself to trouble; because I am not worthy to have you under my roof; and for this same reason I did not presume to come to you myself; but give the word and let my servant be cured. For I am under authority myself, and have soldiers under me; and I say to one man: Go, and he goes; to another: Come here, and he comes; to my servant: Do this, and he does it.'

When Jesus heard these words he was astonished at him and, turning round, said to the crowd following him, 'I tell you, not even in Israel have I found faith like this.' And when the messengers got back to the house they found the servant in perfect health.

Learning together

In class we are learning about the Liturgy of the Eucharist. We learned that just before receiving Holy Communion, we say the words the centurion said to Jesus, "Lord, I am not worthy that you should enter under my roof, but only say

the word and my soul shall be healed." When we receive Jesus we know we're not worthy of such a great visitor, but Jesus wants to come into the home of our hearts to heal us and be our friend.




